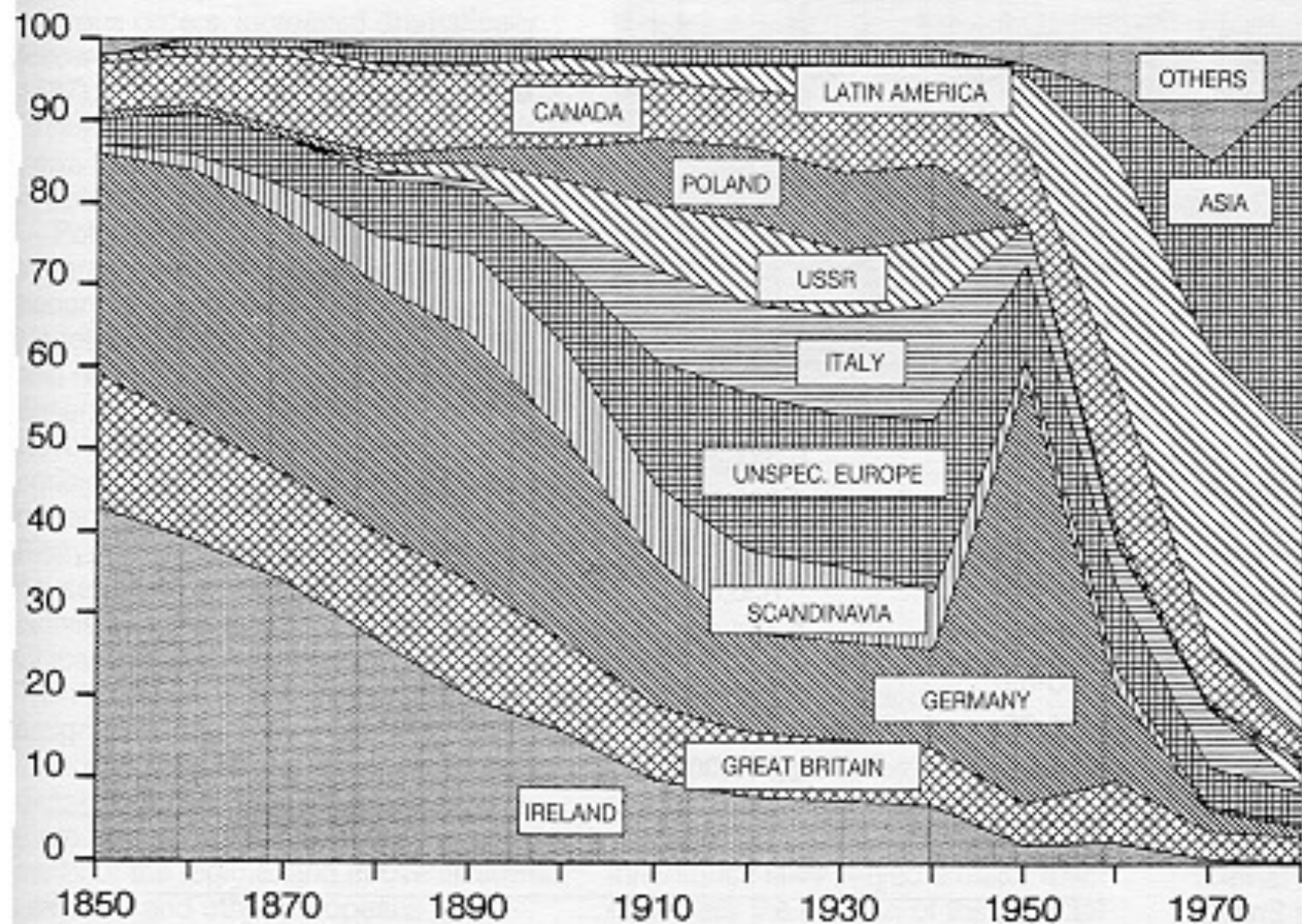

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Table 2. Immigration in the U.S.A. 1850-1980 (annual total = 100%)



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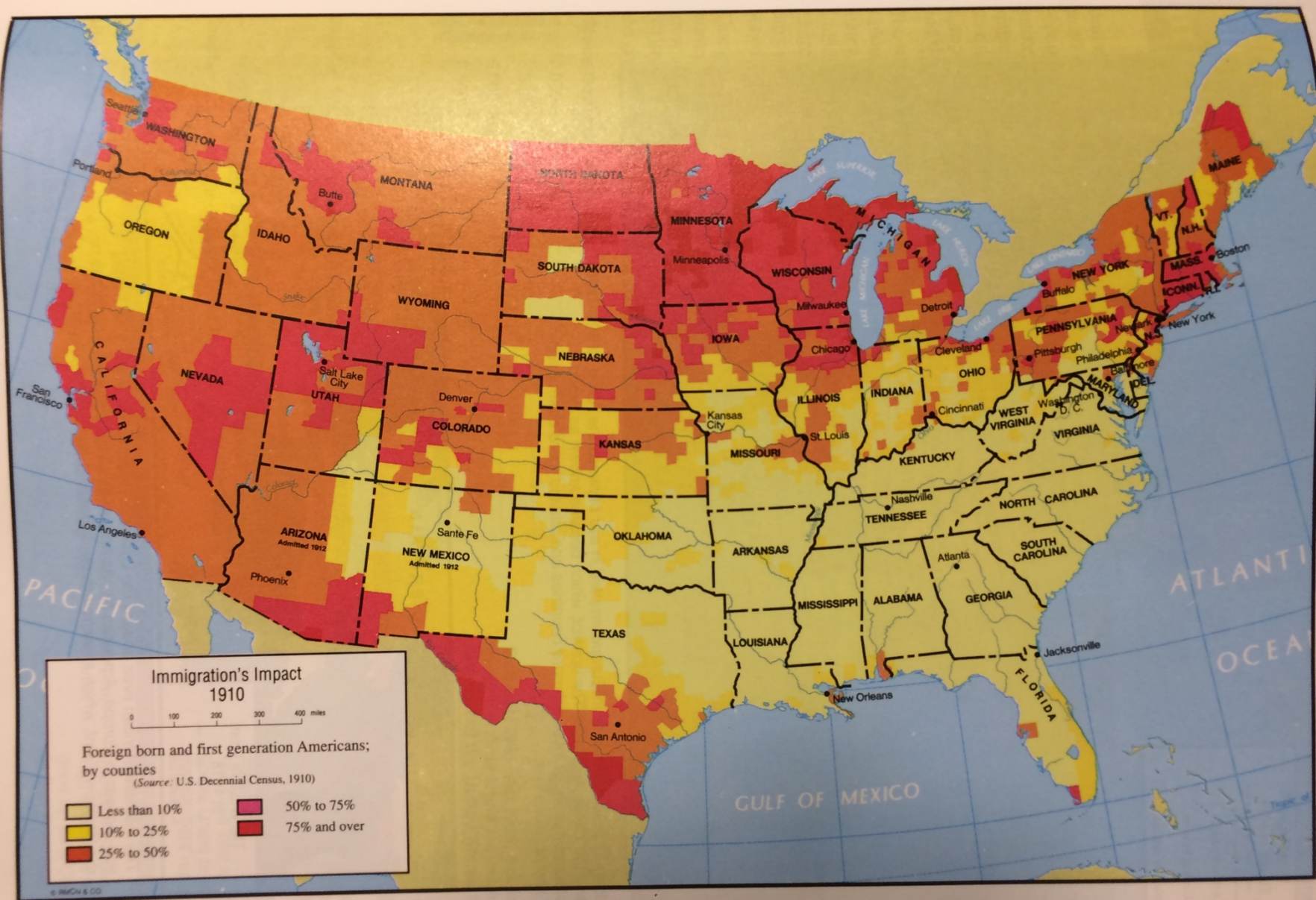

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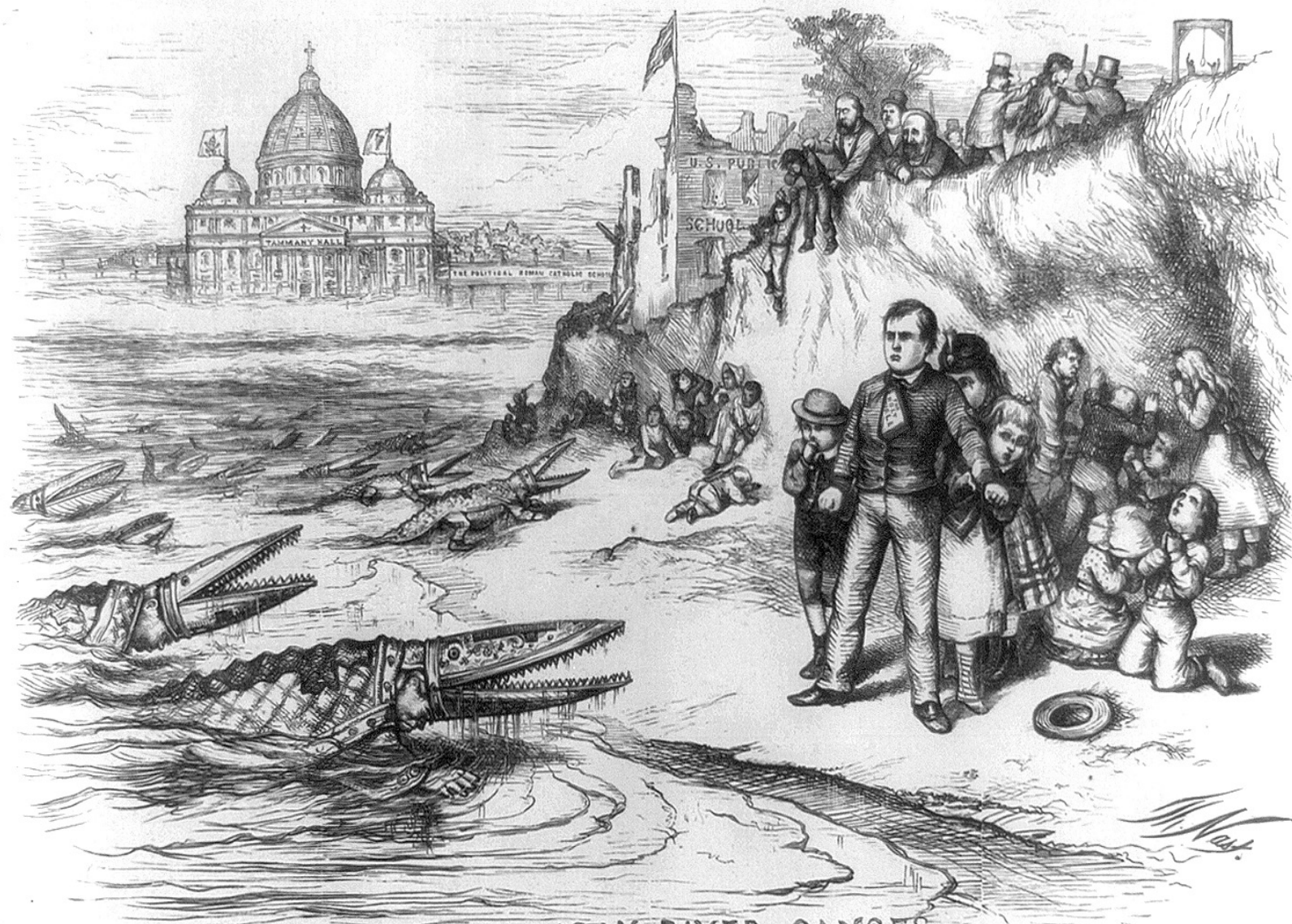

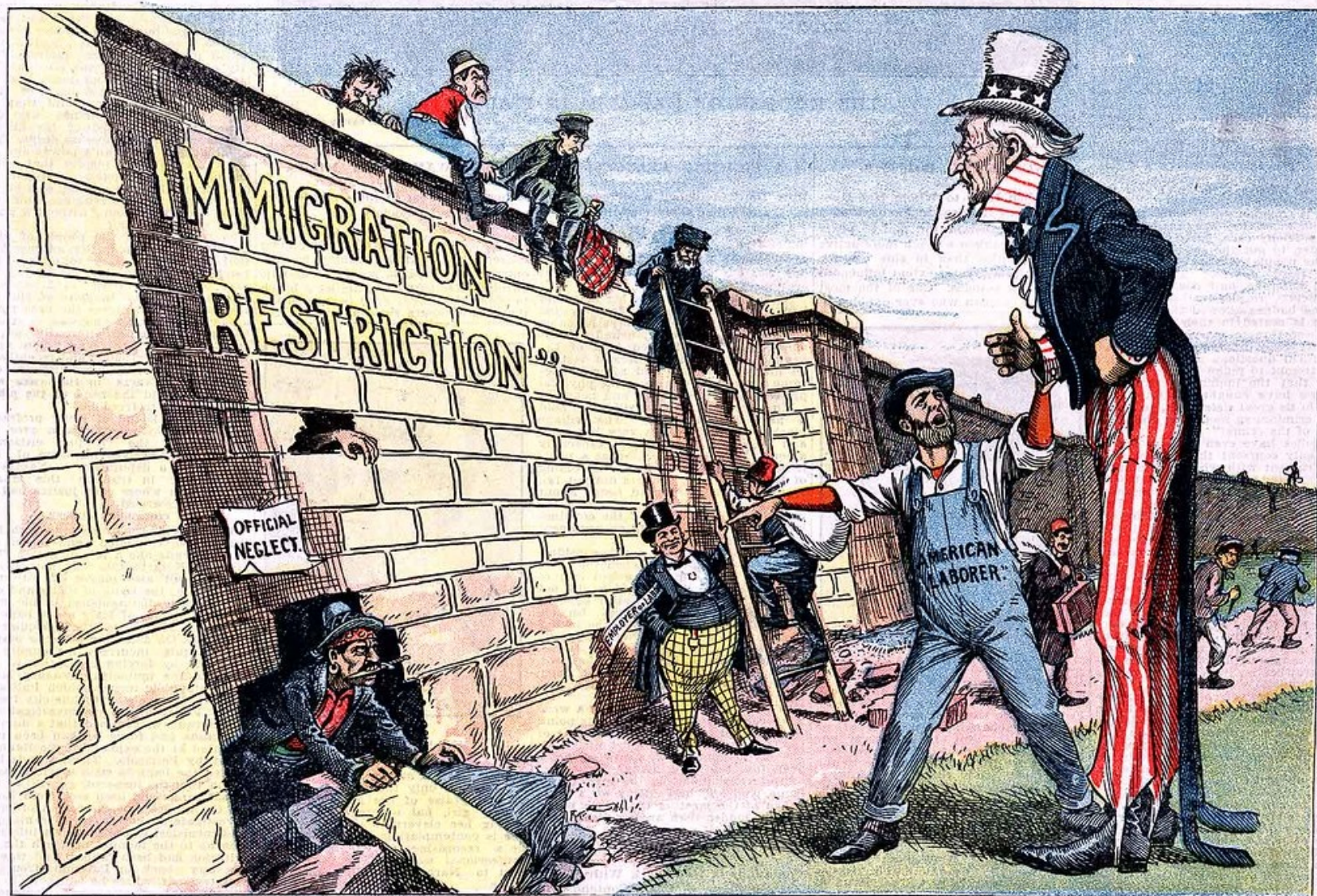
